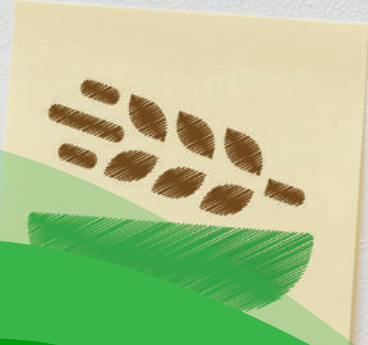

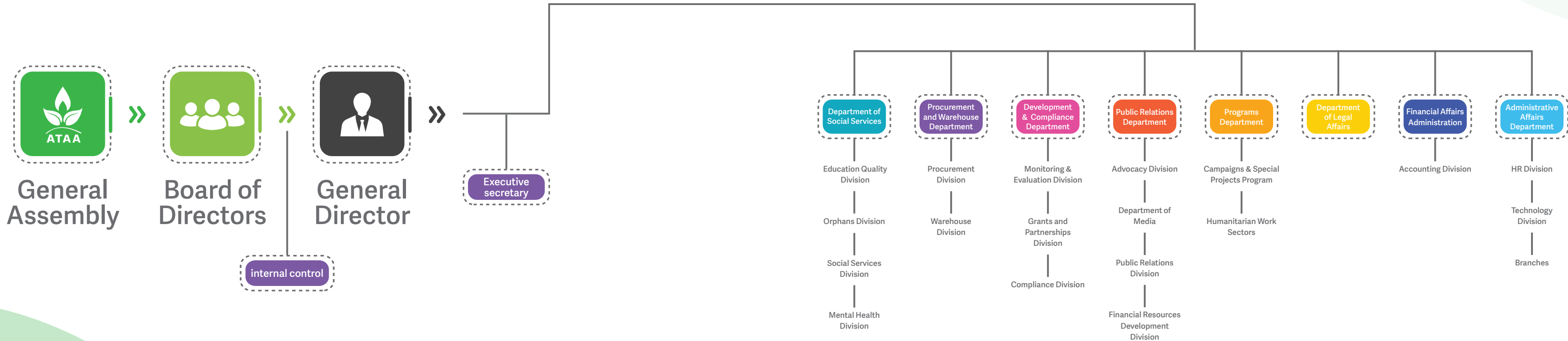

Ten years have passed since the biggest humanitarian crisis in the Middle East in the twentieth century, in which 5.5 million Syrian refugees were displaced around the world, and 6.3 million displaced people inside Syria, mostly women and children, lost their breadwinners after killing more than 400,000 people. The scale of the tragedy required an unprecedented response from the local volunteer teams and regional and international institutions to save lives and protect the grieving civilians. The volunteer team founding of Ataa played a prominent role due to its early response in 2011. A trustworthy and sincere constituent body runs Ataa association, and a team of well-trained and specialized young men and women works in the implementation, and today their number exceeds a thousand employees and volunteers distributed in northern Syria and Turkey, working with sincerity and dedication. Ataa team believes in the importance of coordination and building partnerships, as it does not work alone, but rather coordinates humanitarian work with dozens of local, regional and international institutions, networks and links to provide an integrated service. We believe that what we are doing is an attempt to ease the societal rift caused by the war and provide our humanitarian services without discrimination to build bridges of peace between the torn Syrian community, but we also believe that peace will certainly be achieved when the Syrian people attain the lost freedom and dignity.

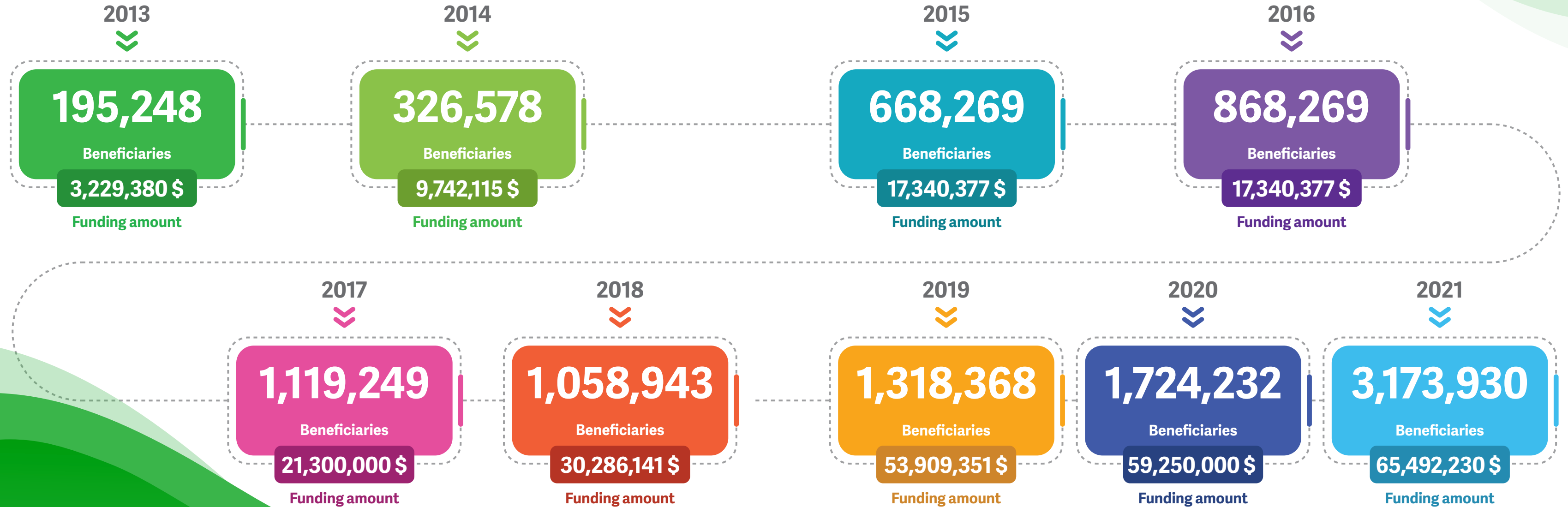

Food Security Sector



The food security and livelihoods sector contributes to reducing poverty in affected communities for all vulnerable people and build family flexibility by, regularly, facilitating food access to those in need and enhance their ability to obtain a stable income resource by Supporting agricultural and livestock production projects and sustainable livelihoods.

Distribution of food baskets and food vouchers

Food projects aim to alleviate poverty by providing access to food for war-affected people especially IDPs and people living in camps by providing life-saving food to meet their essential nutritional needs in addition to raising the nutritional level and preventing malnutrition for children aged 6 to 23 months, via providing specialized nutritious foods to prevent acute malnutrition and micronutrient deficiency.



Distribution of Flour and Bread

Bread distribution and bakery support projects aim to enhance food security for the population by distributing free bread to families and supporting bakeries by providing flour or operational costs to reduce production costs and prevent price increases.

The Shelter and Non-Food Items Sector seeks to remedy the problems of sheltering the displaced by building housing complexes and providing the people with decent housing through providing rehabilitation and restoration services for housing and infrastructure inside and outside the camps, in addition to emergency response activities and the provision of basic non-food necessities that help provide a decent and safe life.

This project focuses on improving shelter conditions for IDPs living in camps to address the challenges of living in tents throughout the seasons.

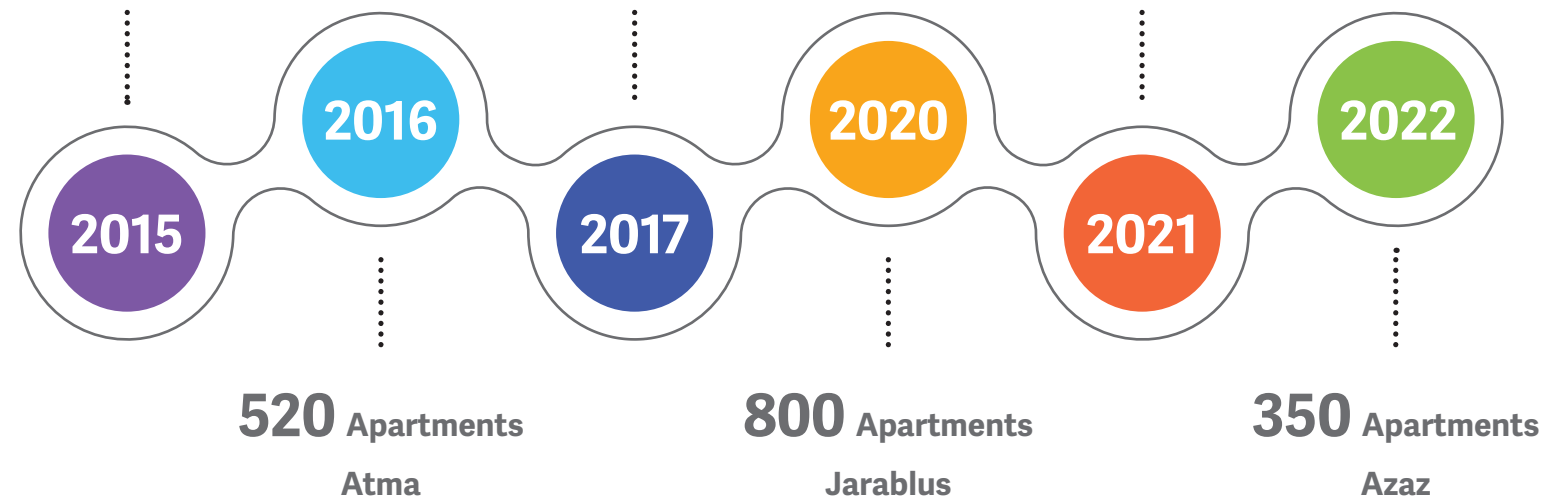

The protection sector helps prevent individuals from being exposed to risks, ensures respect for their rights, and responds to cases exposed to any form of violence and abuse, in addition to focusing on capacity building for the most vulnerable individuals and communities, including women, children, the elderly, and people with special needs, and disseminating the principles of protection in all sectors of humanitarian work.

Child Protection

Public Protection

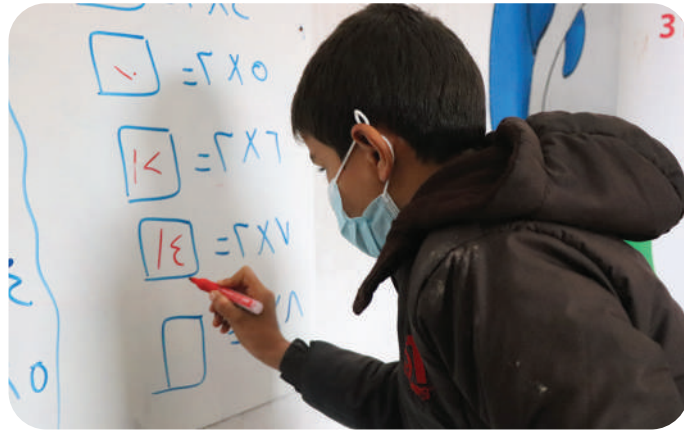

Health Sector



The health sector seeks to improve access to primary, secondary and advanced health care services to its beneficiaries, raise awareness about diseases and prevent them, in addition to establishing and expanding specialized services, contribute to the rehabilitation of cadres working in the field of health care and public health workers.

Prosthetics and Physiotherapy Center

The center aims to provide physical therapy sessions for all types of injuries, in addition to the service of installation and maintenance of prosthetic limbs and rehabilitation of the amputees psychologically and socially. It also provides accommodation and transportation for beneficiaries to and from the center.



Mobile Clinics

It aims to deliver free medical services, including tests and medicines, to the camps and hard-to-reach areas where the displaced are located, and to conduct awareness sessions about diseases and their prevention.

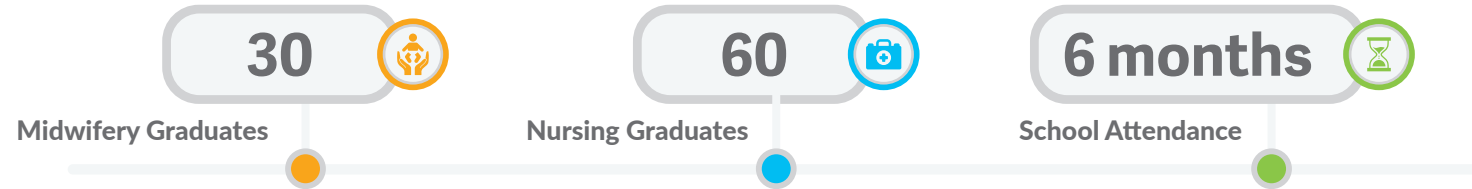
Nursing and Midwifery School

It is the first school of its kind in northeastern Syria, which is concerned with increasing the number of effective medical staff and providing the health sector, which suffers from an acute shortage of human resources, with trained medical cadres capable of working and dealing with exceptional circumstances.

Vocational Institute

Ataa, through the Ataa Vocational Institute, works on rehabilitating young men and women by providing vocational training in a number of professions required in the regions of northwestern Syria. The trainees are also trained in managing small projects, marketing and entrepreneurship, and the project finances a number of small enterprises for some of the trainees with small grants.

Assisting IDPs and host communities by providing sustainable and life-saving WASH services and assistance to the most vulnerable people in water services-deprived areas with high WASH needs. In addition to hard-to-reach sites any sustainable water system and improved access to water supply, sanitation and hygiene.

Infrastructure and Water Quality Assurance

Through rehabilitation and maintenance of existing water systems and distribution of water treatment and disinfection products, including operational support. And do improvements to the water supply in schools, child-friendly spaces and health care facilities. In addition to providing sustainable solutions by installing alternative energy systems where possible.



Sewage and Solid Waste Management

By expanding the water and sewage distribution networks in the communities and camps by connecting them to the existing water and sewage pipes. In addition to constructing and rehabilitating latrines and showers, and periodic emptying of sewage tanks, including the regular management of solid waste and its distribution in rubbish bins.

Hygiene and Control of the Spread of COVID-19

Through the distribution of in-kind hygiene materials that encourage the promotion of healthy behavior, in addition to implementing awareness-raising activities on prevention methods with the aim of improving knowledge of comprehensive health practices.

Camp Coordination & Management



The sector generally covers everything related to coordinating work between different sectors and various agencies operating within the same camp, and with other camps, to ensure the smooth running of humanitarian work and the delivery of humanitarian assistance to those who deserve it without doubling the service. The sector also covers the affairs of camp governance and management, including the formation of community committees within the social fabric of the camp to reach self-reliance and spread awareness of organizing the community within societal structures and bodies.

Enhanced Resilience and Access

By strengthening the abilities of those in charge of camp management in terms of participatory planning and implementation of projects to improve the camps, coordinate their work and meet the needs of the population, in order to ensure the participation of the local community and ensure that the services and protection provided are in line with laws, guidelines and standards agreed.

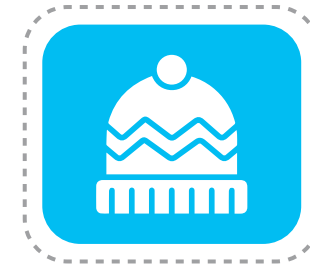

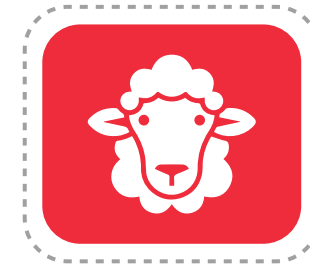

He came in a miserable condition.. paralysis, ulcers, and dependence on others with all his own work. In this case, the young Ahmed Muhaimid arrived at Ataa Specialized Center for the rehabilitation of spinal cord injuries, After he fell from the third floor while working with wood carpentry.

Now Muhaimid is a flame of hope, facing disability with patience and overcoming his disability with will and hope. He relies on himself and walks alone for a distance of up to one kilometer, after being treated at Ataa Center and integrating him into the community, going ahead with determination, patience and faith that draws attention.

Rafid goes out to work on it every day, distributing foodstuffs to groceries, and working with unspeakable passion and conviction, and his only wish was the survival of the work to continue keeping his family’s livelihood.

Ataa Association works through its projects to respond to humanitarian situations, by providing material and in-kind assistance, once or monthly, to the most vulnerable groups of displaced and residents. In addition to receiving requests for assistance for urgent humanitarian cases, categorizing and verifying them through specialized social researchers, and then submitting the approved requests to specialized committees to consider the type of support, duration and value.

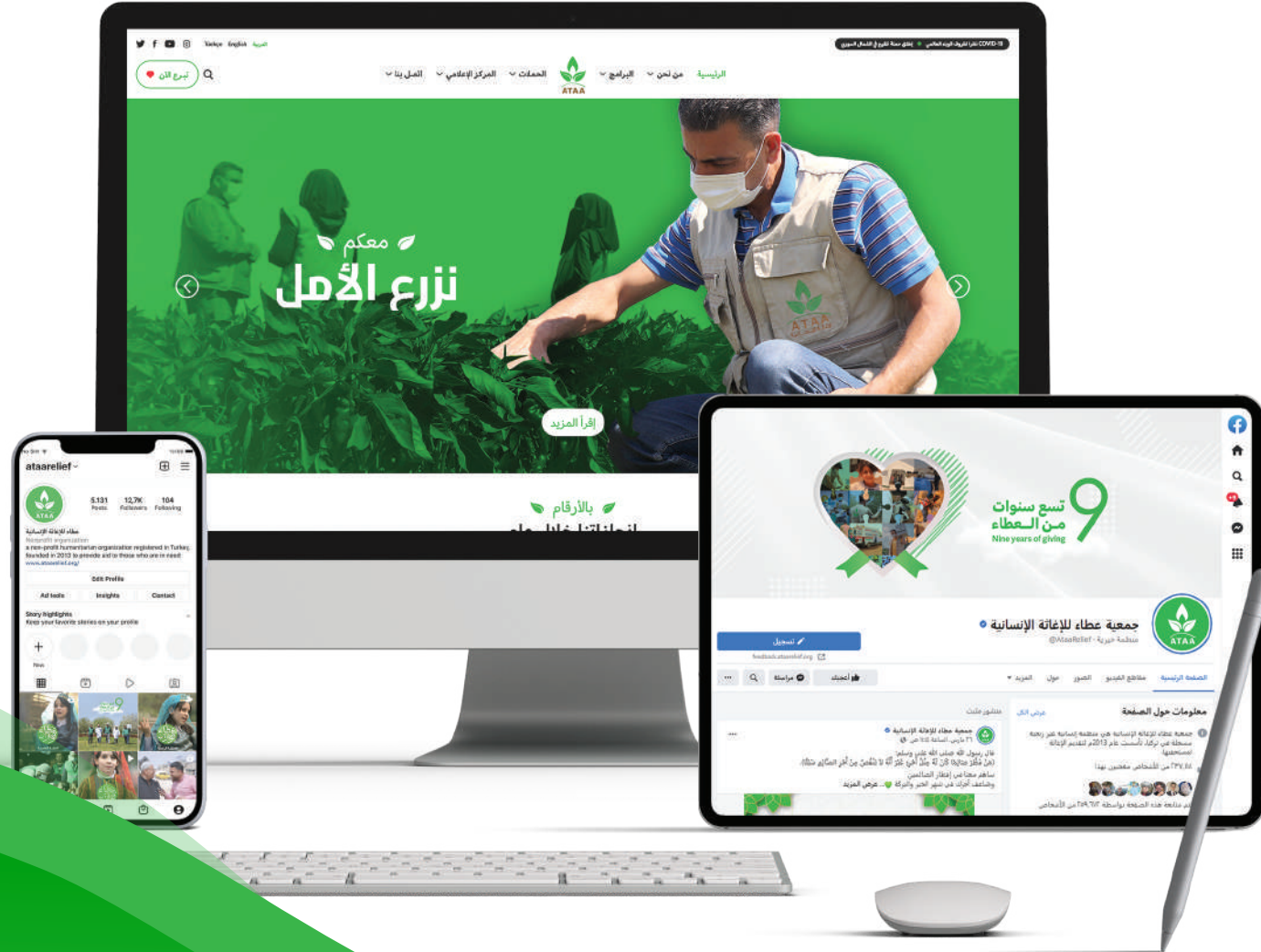
